Rich Toward God

"... rich toward God." Luke 12:21

Our hearts will always be somewhere. Jesus talks about this often in the gospels (check out Luke 12:34). The desire of our hearts will be with what we treasure

the most. Jesus is continually calling us to make God our treasure, to have our hearts centered on God. One of the ways we know our hearts are centered on God is when we find ourselves believing what Jesus believes. That is a different kind of believing. Many people believe things about Jesus while their hearts are somewhere else. Believing what Jesus believes comes from being rich toward God. There are other ways to become more and more rich toward God: doing what Jesus does, loving what Jesus loves, or seeing what Jesus sees.

How Do You Do That?

My first suggestion is to realize that any thought you have of God came from God in the first place. Building on that realization we can ask God to give us the same belief system Jesus has, and then to have the ability to love what Jesus loves, and then the power to do what Jesus does. We can keep going like this with everything God brings to our minds. We become rich toward God by acting upon and growing in everything God gives us. Developing a habit of paying attention to what God is saying and then carrying out what God wants us to do about that will open up a lifestyle of becoming rich toward God. You might find the Prayer of St. Francis above a helpful way to start praying each morning.
