# **Community Transformation**

The harvest is plentiful but the laborers are few. Luke 10:2

#### What's the Focus?

The teaching that comes forward for Luke 10:2 above usually focuses on the laborers. It is good to have that focus and to equip Christians to be "laborers in the harvest." The more laborers the better. However, I would like to suggest that Jesus is also talking about the harvest here as well. The "harvest" is just as important as the "laborers."

### The Harvest

A crop ready for harvest has come to a very strong and mature point in its life. The sight of a large field filled with a crop ready to be harvested is a beautiful, even breath-taking, sight. That sight is filled with life, growth, power, and hope. Before the reaper comes to bring in the harvest there has been a lot going on with the crop itself. Life has been flowing through each plant. Sun, rain, and nutrients in the soil have been increasing the size of the crop. God has been at work bringing that crop to maturity.

### **Our Communities**

Just like an agricultural crop will grow into maturity and produce a great deal of fruit, so our communities have life, growth, power, and hope within them. That is because God is at work in our communities. There are great gifts and assets among our neighbors. To "harvest" those gifts is to encourage them, bring them out, and help weave them together with the other gifts in the community. That is what brings community transformation.

### Celebration

This Sunday at St. Francis we gather to celebrate a new season of ministry together. Bishop Goff will be with us along with others from the community to ask God to equip us to move into this new season. One of the great opportunities before us is the prospect of community transformation in Manakin-Sabot, Centerville, and beyond. Community transformation is one of the aspects of the strategic vision of St. Francis. It is summed up in this statement from our strategic plan:
