This Coming Sunday at St. Francis

When we gather for worship on Sunday at St. Francis on October 25th our Bishop Suffragran, The Rt. Rev. Susan Goff, will be with us to preside, preach, and confirm and receive our new members. It will be a wonderful time and all of us are looking forward to it very much. Things will go differntly than ususal that day. We will meet at 2:00pm instead of 10:00am. We will present about a dozen people who will either be confirmed, received, or renew their baptismal vows. After a brief reception the bishop will meet with our vestry. The Impact

The verse cited above is one of the choices for the gospel reading at the ordination and consecration of a bishop in the Episcopal Church. This reading, as well as others, talk about the church being sent. The bishop's visit brings that part of following Jesus into sharp focus. Most people think of a church as that group of people from whom you receive encouragement and help when you need it. That is true, but there is more. It is also the group with whom you worship God, and it is the group from whom you are sent into the world with the love of Jesus. All three are essential. When you go out from the gathering of the church in worship you may want others to know about the great experince you have with that group. You are not sent alone by God to do your best all by yourself. Just as Jesus was sent by a community, the Trinity, so we are sent by our community, our church. In most cases we go to share the love of Jesus with others as a group. The bishop's visit reminds us that we are not in this alone. We are in it together with our frineds at church, and with the millions of other Christians worldwide.

We also can rely on the power of God. The bishop's visit reminds us of that as well. The bishop wears a mitre, as pictured above. The two pointed sections at the top represent the tongues of fire that appeard over the heads of the church members on that first Pentecost. The two bands in the back represent anointing flowing from the Spirit of God to the whole of the Body of Christ. We are definitely empowered with the rest of the church to carry out the wonderful work God gives us to do.
