

Bless the Lord, O my soul, and all that is within me bless his holy name. Psalm 103:1

The Short Story

Today is the commemoration of John and Charles Wesley. During the great revival of the 1700's in England, God used John and Charles Wesley very powerfully. John preached in the open air to great crowds. To support those who had experienced a conversion to Christ, he organized a system of groups for continued Christian growth and development. In fact, he would not preach in an area where he did not have people ready to lead those groups when he left for the next town. Charles wrote the hymns used in worship at all of these various meetings. He wrote over 600 hymns. Many of them we sing today. One collection written by Charles, Hymns on the Lord's Supper, brought many new Christians to the practice of receiving communion regularly. Between these two brothers they had established a system of making growing disciples who were devoted to worship. Many historians believe that the revival lead by the Wesleys was so deeply transformative of English society that England was saved from a bloody revolution like the one that took place in France during the same period of history. The fruit of their ministry continues today all over the world in the Methodist Church as well as many other Christian movements and denominations.

The Source

In the overwhelming activity of revival which included discipling leaders, handling conflict, dealing with outside criticism, and a relentless schedule, the Wesleys maintained a rich practice of worship as their first priority. The 600+ hymns Charles wrote were written in that challenging revival atmosphere. The source for energy, ministry, and life, was found in worshipping God. The same energy, ministry and life is available for us from the same source- worshipping God with all of our heart, mind, soul, and strength. It is out of this experience of worshipping God that Charles wrote lyrics that help to prompt us into worship:

Finish then thy new creation; pure and spotless let us be; let us see thy great salvation perfectly restored in thee: changed from glory into glory, till in heaven we take our place, till we cast our crowns before thee, lost in wonder, love, and praise.
